

Attorneys Will Build Office Structure

PLANS have been announced for the construction of a two story office building at 1220 H Street.

Attorneys Philip F. Driver and Thomas M. Hunt reported they have signed a contract with Guth and Schmidt, general contractors, for the erection of the structure, which will contain 10,000 square feet of floor area.

A portion of the building site formerly was occupied by the old four story Ruhstaller mansion, built in 1875.

Designed by the architectural firm of Rickey and Brooks under the direction of associate Benedict Adams, the office building will feature a combination of bronzed

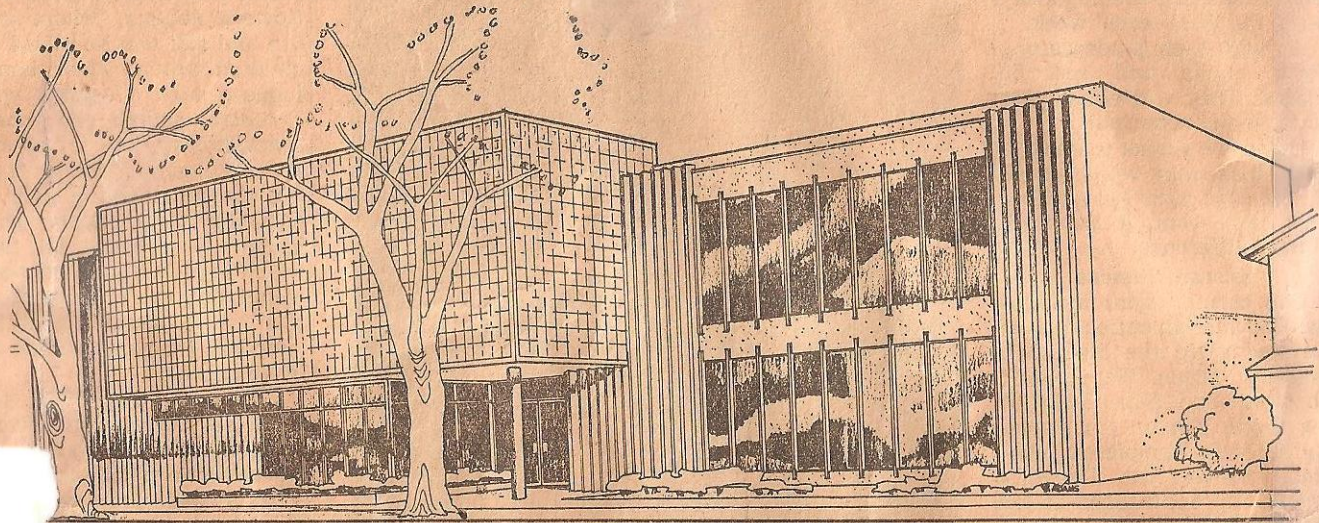
aluminum, glass, perforated masonry screens and a new type concrete block wall created especially for the project.

A focal point of the carpeted lobby will be a waterfall and pond. Another feature of the building will be a new air conditioning system utiliz-

ing perforated, acoustical ceilings through which the conditioned air will flow.

A paved parking lot in the rear of the structure will ac-

commodate more than 50 cars. Among the occupants of the building will be the law firm of Driver, Driver & Hunt.
